ALUMNI PROFILE

RICK CELEBRINI GRADUATING YEAR: 1992



Sometimes misfortune brings opportunity in life. Well, lightning actually struck twice relative to my professional career as a physiotherapist. My first exposure to physiotherapy was as a 15 year old soccer player after recovering from a fractured ankle. I was fortunate to have been referred to Alex McKechnie for my rehab and found myself surrounded by athletes from the Canucks, Whitecaps and Lions. I remember thinking at that time what a "cool" job physiotherapy would be. Little did I know that Alex would soon become a teacher, mentor and then partner and friend.

In my first tour with the national soccer team, at 20 years old, I fractured my left foot. This would eventually keep me out of soccer for the better part of 2 ½ years. This misfortune was the catalyst to my entering the PT program and focusing on my education rather than soccer. Although I did continue playing soccer with the Vancouver 86ers for a number of years, 3 ACL injuries finally ended my career - maybe lightning struck three times.

I graduated from UBC in 1992 and after working with Alex for a year, he recommended me as the physiotherapist with the Canadian Alpine Men's Ski Team. I traveled with the team full time for 2 years including to the Winter Olympics in Lillehammer in 1994. I have remained involved with the team (including the Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City in 2002) until today.

My personal experiences with injuries as a young athlete have formed the foundation and passion for my career path. In 2002, after 10 years in private practice, I decided that although I absolutely loved working with young athletes and ensuring they didn't follow the same injury plagued athletic path as I did, I wanted to make a bigger difference than one athlete at a time. I started my Masters in 2003, under the supervision of Dr. Donna MacIntyre, focusing on injury prevention in young athletes. I fast tracked into the PhD program a year later and refined my thesis to investigate strategies for the prevention of ACL injuries in young female soccer players. I am presently completing the data analysis of and have started writing my PhD dissertation.

I presently maintain a limited clinical practice only seeing athletes with chronic, recalcitrant conditions that require re-education of dysfunctional movement patterns as I have been appointed as Chief Therapist and Medical Manager for the Vancouver 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. These are obviously very busy times professionally, which are balanced with time for my wife Robyn and our two sons, Aiden (4) and Macklin (2) and one on the way for good measure. I feel very blessed to have so many fantastic things going on in my life but the challenge will be to keep all the plates spinning.

The plan for the future is to influence the development of young athletes with education and programs that emphasize injury prevention and fun. I would also like to continue providing guidance and education to our MPT students and new grads. Of course, I will always remain a clinician but plan to augment this passion with clinical research. This teaching, research, and clinical work may all tie together nicely in the new Multisport Centre of Excellence - an athlete development centre planned to open in Burnaby late next year. Surprising, sometimes, what a little misfortunate can bring

Susan Harris was named the 2008 Faculty of Medicine Distinguished Clinical Medical Research Lecturer Awardee. This award recognizes her outstanding contributions in medical research for clinical sciences.

RETIREMENT OF SUSAN HARRIS



The Department would like to thank **Dr. Susan Harris** for her years of exceptional service to the Department, Faculty and the community. She is an expert in the identification of cognitive and motor delays and early interventions for infants born with developmental disabilities, she developed the Harris Infant Neuromotor Test and has impacted all aspects of pediatric rehabilitation research. She has been an invited speaker internationally and, as such, has influenced the wider research community for more than 20 years.

After her own battle with breast cancer in 1994, she developed a line of inquiry related to appropriate rehabilitation and exercise prescription for women with breast cancer. She was an original member of "Abreast in a Boat", the world's first Dragon Boat team comprised entirely of women living with breast cancer. Her research has examined safe levels of exercise for breast cancer survivors, as well as communication between cancer survivors and their health care team. She performed a pioneering clinical trial on women with breast cancer who participated in the vigorous, upper-body sport of dragon boat racing. Her clinical study, together with the success of the dragon boat teams, has provided a very clear message to individuals with breast cancer and health care providers that physical activity can be undertaken by breast cancer survivors. Her scientific publications in leading Canadian and American medical journals have led to the enhancement of quality of life for women with breast cancer, and she is the lead author of the Canadian clinical practice guidelines for the management of breast cancer-related lymphedema.

Dr. Harris' interactions with students at all levels of their education are truly learner-centered. Her research accomplishments are uniquely balanced by the value she places on the educational components of the academic program, her support of physiotherapy initiatives in the community, and her understanding of the realities of physical therapy clinical practice. She has long been an advocate for evidence-based practice (EBP) in physical therapy and has presented and published several papers on EBP. After serving on the editorial board of *Physical Therapy* for five years, Dr Harris became the Editor of *Physiotherapy Canada* in 2003.

Dr Harris has received many awards and honours. In 1992, she received the Marian Williams Award for Research, the highest research honour of the American Physical Therapy Association. In 1999, she received an Honorary Doctor of Science degree from the University of Indianapolis. In 2005, she was inducted as a Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences. In 2006, she was awarded the Enid Graham Memorial Lecture Award, the most prestigious award by the Canadian Physiotherapy Association. She has also received the Barbara C White Lecture Award from the Department of Physical Therapy at the University of Florida, the Golden Pen Award and the Catherine Worthington Fellow Award from the American Physical Therapy Association, the Mary Switzer Distinguished Research Fellow Award from the National Institute on Disability and Rehabilitation Research of the US Department of Education, and Honorary membership from the Canadian Physiotherapy Association.

FACULTY RESEARCH GRANTS

Lara Boyd and Janice Eng have been awarded a 3 year grant from The Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada for a study entitled "Promotion of brain reorganization after stroke". The purpose of this three year study is to determine whether pairing brain stimulation with motor practice facilitates motor learning in individuals with chronic stroke.

Darlene Reid was awarded seed funding from NIH to examine the genetic markers of muscle in people with osteoporosis.

Linda Li and Teresa Liu-Ambrose obtained a CIHR team grant titled: Centre for Hip Health and Mobility: A Team Approach to Mobility in Vulnerable Seniors

He received his Master of Physical Therapy degree and his PhD from the University of Western Ontario, both in 2007. He is currently completing a two-

year post-doctoral fellowship at the University of Melbourne: Centre for Health, Exercise and Sports Medicine.

His research interests are in the area of clinical biomechanics with a particular emphasis on knee injuries. His previous work has examined the effectiveness of surgical and exercise interventions on knee biomechanics and quality of life in patients with knee osteoarthritis. He typically uses various testing methods for his research, including motion analysis and strength assessment, and plans to continue with these at UBC. He is also hoping to use visual feedback mechanisms to improve gait retraining strategies for patients with varying pathologies. His clinical and teaching interests lie in the areas of clinical and orthopaedic biomechanics as well as musculoskeletal injuries.

Apart from research, Michael is an avid outdoorsman who enjoys skiing in the winter and golfing and hiking in the summer.

We are also delighted to welcome Kristin L. Campbell, Ph.D. to the Department as an Assistant Professor, commencing in January 2009. Kristin has a history at UBC having received her MSc at the School of Human Kinetics after receiving her BSc PT degree from Queen's University in Kingston, ON. She went on to obtain her Ph.D. from University of Alberta in Edmonton, AB. She is completing her post-doctoral fellowship at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Centre in Seattle WA, with Dr. Anne McTiernan.

Her research interests are focused on the role of physical activity across the cancer experience, namely in prevention, rehabilitation from cancer treatments and cancer survivorship. She has investigated the role of physical activity in cancer prevention by examining the effect of exercise on proposed biomarkers of breast and colon cancer risk, such as sex hormones, inflammatory markers and tissue protein expression. In terms of rehabilitation from cancer treatment and cancer survivors, her research has focused on examining the benefits of physical activity on physical function, quality of life, fatigue and lymphedema, and is interested in starting to examine the emerging evidence for the role of physical activity in lowering risk of cancer recurrence. Her research spans a range from small scale intervention studies to multi-center randomized controlled trials and large cohort studies.





Three PhD students have been admitted to candidacy by successfully completing their comprehensive examinations and defending their research proposals. **Marc Roig's** (PhD Cand.) research will involve the identification of risk factors for falls of individuals with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. **Paula Rushton** (PhD Cand.) is developing an instrument to measure confidence in wheelchair mobility. **Jill Zwicker** (PhD Cand.) is examining motor learning, neuroplasticity, and quality of life of children with developmental coordination disorder.


CLINICAL FACULTY AWARDS
